



Everyone in My Family Has Killed Someone Available November 1st – Due at November 23rd Meeting



I am Malala: The Girl Who Stood Up for Education and Was Shot by the Taliban Available January 1st - Due at January 25th Meeting



When the Taliban took control of the Swat Valley in Pakistan, one girl spoke out. Malala Yousafzai refused to be silenced and fought for her right to an education. On Tuesday, October 9, 2012, she was shot in the head at point-blank range while riding the bus home from school, and few expected her to survive. Instead, Malala's miraculous recovery has taken her on an extraordinary journey from a remote valley in northern Pakistan to the halls of the United Nations in New York. At sixteen, she became a global symbol of peaceful protest and the youngest nominee ever for the Nobel Peace Prize.




